



## **Progressing through Levels**

There are three Levels to the John Muir Award. The Discovery Award is undertaken first. You can encourage further activity and involvement by moving on to the next Levels – Explorer and Conserver Awards.

- Use the information pointers in the table below to help guide your John Muir Award progression.
- Consider what's appropriate to your wild places, your activities and your group.
- Use the John Muir Award Proposal Form to demonstrate your plans.

## **Repeating Levels**

John Muir Award participation is a unique experience for each individual who takes part. Each Award is delivered by different organisations in different wild places, with their own unique approaches and activities. You are welcome to repeat the same Award Level – with a different organisation or in different places or with different people – as this provides opportunities for new and valuable experiences.
